Hokusai (1760-1849) was a Japanese artist and printmaker.


He is best known for the woodblock print series Thirtysix Views of Mount Fuji which includes the iconic print

conditions.

Fact file:

Hokusai began painting as a young child

He was known by at least 30 different names during his lifetime! It was common for Japanese artists to change their names but Hokusai did more often than any other major artists.

He also loved moving house and it is thought that he lived in more than 90 dwellings during his lifetime!

Apparently both Monet and Degas were 2 artists who admired his work! He worked very hard and it is thought that he produced more than 30,000 pictures! Take a look at some online and choose your favourite.


The Great Wave off Kanagawa




Art activities

Build the picture in stages




1. Draw a wave using a sharp pencil and invent the details of the wave fingers
